Thoughts from the Pastor...

Greetings All,

Romans 13:1-7

¹³Let every person be subject to the governing authorities; for there is no authority except from God, and those authorities that exist have been instituted by God.

²Therefore whoever resists authority resists what God has appointed, and those who resist will incur judgment. ³For rulers are not a terror to good conduct, but to bad. Do you wish to have no fear of the authority? Then do what is good, and you will receive its approval; ⁴for it is God's servant for your good. But if you do what is wrong, you should be afraid, for the authority does not bear the sword in vain! It is the servant of God to execute wrath on the wrongdoer. ⁵Therefore one must be subject, not only because of wrath but also because of conscience. ⁶For the same reason you also pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, busy with this very thing. ⁷Pay to all what is due to them—taxes to whom taxes are due, revenue to whom revenue is due, respect to whom respect is due, honor to whom honor is due.

Paul believed that God ordained governmental leaders for our benefit. The difference between the leaders of our day and the leaders of Paul's day is that we get to choose our leaders. In the USA this process is highlighted on a national level by campaigns and conventions, and as Americans we choose leaders based on a myriad of criteria. One criterion that informs our choice is moral issues. As Christians I feel that this should be our number one issue in selecting a president. However, the question is what moral issue takes precedence over another, and what party candidate will best address moral concerns as each of us defines them.

In the past I remember a meeting of a group of ministers from different denominations where we discussed moral issues. We went around the table and articulated each of our top two moral issues facing the country today. The answers were as diverse as our ecclesiastical differences and are as follows in no particular order.

- 1. Healthcare
- 2. Missing fathers (both economically and spiritually)
- 3. Economic injustice from rich to poor
- 4. Economic injustice from what men make and what women make
- 5. Just wars
- 6. War profiteering
- 7. Right to life (including the elimination of the death penalty)
- 8. Same sex marriage
- 9. Importing goods made by slaves
- 10. Exporting weapons

You can see that moral issues are as diverse as we are individuals. As we enter the final stages of our election process let us consider not what is necessarily best for us as individuals, but what is best for the country as a whole based on moral issues. I urge each of you to reflect on what moral issue is of the biggest concern for you and vote accordingly. I am sure that the list I presented does not exhaust the issues facing the USA in years to come, but I am sure that as God's people you will come up with moral issues that guide your responsibility to pick the proper leader.

Spiritual technology, Modern Communication and Evangelism

In the 1450's there was an invention that would forever transform evangelism and also contribute to the success and expansion of the Reformation movement that gave birth to our church tradition and closely held beliefs. During this time Johannes Gutenberg created the first printing press. This "modern technology" supplied the tools for some new teachings to be widely disseminated while promoting free thought on topics that were formerly strictly under the authority of an educated elite. The Roman Catholic Church controlled all that believers were allowed to hear but not what they could read. By 1519 pamphlets on Martin Luther's 95 Theses, which he had nailed to that old church door, were being circulated for all who were interested in reading it. This was huge. The printing press made Luther the first celebrity author of the Early Modern Period and now the Church authorities could no longer control what information the people consumed regarding the faith. Voila! Reformation!

What was modern technological advancement over 500 years ago of course is now slowly going the way of the dinosaurs it seems. Online and social media has replaced print media almost entirely. Something about communication online however seems to allow for more rudeness and aggressiveness. It's like people forget that there are real life flesh and blood human beings on the other end of some terrible messages and comments. This is no more present than during an Election season where everyone becomes a political expert and campaign worker that feels compelled to let the world know every opinion they have on everything. I for one have been guilty of this myself to the irritation of friends and family I'm sure.

There are some questions I try to ask myself before I post anything on Facebook these days: Is what I'm posting working to lift up those who read it? Will the person who sees my post know that I am a disciple of Lord Jesus? Does this meme promote unity or division? Am I posting this just to receive affirmation from those I know already agree with me? Am I belittling someone who sees this? Am I denying someone the right to be absolutely wrong? Lately in answering these questions to myself I have had to go back and delete certain things I posted. I am a work in progress for sure. Of course knowing your audience is helpful and remembering that is incredibly important whether on the internet or in front of a congregation.

Lord Jesus commissioned us to go into the world and proclaim the good news of salvation to the whole creation. He did not send us to prove everyone wrong or make them feel stupid. The message has been communicated in many ways throughout the centuries. First it was transmitted orally, then written down... later printed using presses and now appearing on computer screens, tablets and cell phones. Digital expressions created by the programming of 1's and 0's. There are really only two messages...the message of humble LOVE or the message of prideful FEAR.

It matters what content you post and repost. It matters how you comment on other people's posts. If God's good news of salvation and unconditional love can be communicated verbally and with the written word, it most certainly can be expressed with posts, memes and videos. And just like in the real world, the way we interact with our neighbor carries the message of the gospel more than any other media ever could. So, the way we treat others on the internet is paramount to carrying out the mission Jesus has given us to perform. So... pray before you post!

RE: Sunday School & Confirmation

Dear Friends in Christ,

You are receiving this letter to encourage you to invite your child to take the next step in their journey as disciples of Jesus. They took their first step as the Holy Spirit called them to a life with Jesus through their baptism. The next series of steps is for them to claim their baptism for themselves and to be confirmed as a member of Christ's church. As parents and guardians, it is our responsibility to fulfill the promises we made when our little ones were baptized so that our children may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace. Our world, our future is depending on the faith our children will develop now in God, in themselves and in their neighbors.

The first step of this process is to be fully engaged in Sunday School. Sunday School provides each young disciple with the building blocks of a future faith and a life with Christ, and Sunday School will be for those 4 years old thru 6th grade. During this time First Communion classes are also offered for children whose parents sense it is appropriate.

The second step is Confirmation classes. Confirmation classes are for anyone 7th grade thru 12th grade. These classes prepare our children for their decision to affirm their baptisms and fully enter church life and all that that means. Good Christian fellowship is also a critical component to the formation that is so crucial to teenagers especially nowadays. Students are also encouraged to attend the White Roses Youth Group where we get some real-life opportunities to put spiritual principles into action.

If you are interested in taking these steps with your child, please plan to attend a meeting with me on Wednesday September 4, 2024, at 7 pm in the Narthex of the church. At this meeting I will give you a schedule of classes for the 2024-2025 Sunday School, Confirmation and Youth Group Year. We will also share contact information to communicate with one another during the year. Sunday School children need not attend but may attend with their parents. Confirmation students must attend with their parents as there will be a short introductory Confirmation class at 7:30, which will only last about 15 minutes.

Recipe from the Church Kitchen

COBBLER

½ c. butter

34 c. milk

1 c. flour

1 egg (beaten)

1 c. sugar

2 c. any fruit

2 tsp. baking powder

2 T. cinnamon/sugar mixture

½ tsp. salt

Put fruit in bottom of greased square pan. Using a mixer, cream butter and sugar. Add flour, baking powder, salt, milk and egg. Pour over fruit. Pour ½ c. boiling water over mixture. Sprinkle cinnamon/sugar mixture on top. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes-until golden and bubbly.

APPLE CRISP

2-3 peeled, sliced apples

3/4 c. oatmeal

¹/₄ c. flour

½ c. sugar

1/4 c. brown sugar

2 T. flour

½ tsp. baking powder

1/4 tsp. cinnamon

1/3 c. melted butter

Put apples in a 9 in. pie dish. Mix sugar, 2 T. flour, and cinnamon. Toss with apples. Mix oatmeal, ¼ c. flour, brown sugar, and baking powder. Pour over apples. Pour melted butter over the top. Bake at 375° for 35mins. Serve hot or cold with cream or ice cream.
