#### Thoughts from the Pastor...

Greetings All,

In ancient days the people of Israel grew tired of Samuel's corrupt sons as their Judges and demanded that God raise up a king for them like all the other powerful nations around them. They wrongfully assumed that power and might made for good leadership and a secure lifestyle. God listened to the people and had God's faithful servant Samuel anoint Saul as their king. Saul was readily accepted as their king as he was large in stature, "he stood head and shoulders above everyone else" (1 Samuel 9:2b). We often see physical size as an attribute of strength and leadership. Unfortunately, as was with Saul's case, the physical strength doesn't always correlate to inner strength. Saul let his inners fears overcome him, and he began to lead out of fear instead of listening to God's Word, which was a one time the source of his inner strength.

Saul was eventually removed as king and Samuel was directed to go see Jesse of Bethlehem to choose a successor for Saul from one of Jesse's sons. Of course, Jesse brought out his seven physically strong sons and when God rejected them Samuel asked about his eighth son. Jesse was perplexed as his youngest was tending to the sheep and was gentle, liked to sing, and liked to play the lyre. He wasn't a warrior like the elder sons were. David was brought before Samuel and he declared that this is the one who God has selected after his own heart to lead the people of Israel. God works in mysterious and unpredictable ways that are often counter intuitive as to what we see as strength and power. We often see size or wealth as attributes of strength and prosperity, but God uses the small, the poor, and the weak to demonstrate God's power.

I am hopeful that our ministry at Augustana can work in the same manner. For example, we have a container in the Narthex with simple paper bags in it saying, "Food Pantry". For this ministry to work all we need to do is pick up one of these simple paper bags, take it to the grocery store the next time you go and buy whatever is written on the bag and bring it to the church. By placing the bag in the Food Pantry container, we are placing these simple, weak, bags of small food items into God's hands for ministry. To us it doesn't seem like much. How could we possibly think that this small amount could make a difference in anyone's life here in America? How could anyone ever think that timid, weak, music loving David could ever slay Goliath?

As an avalanche usually starts out as a snowball, our little "Food Pantry and Blessing Box" ministries has snowballed into an avalanche of support for those who depend on them. Our simple, seemingly insignificant ministry has provided a mountain of love and support for the families who suffer from food insecurity in 21<sup>st</sup> century America. Fighting food insecurity is only one of the things we do in the name of Jesus here at Augustana.

As we will have a 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in the month of March, Chris and I have decided to highlight the ministries that happen at Augustana and to celebrate them at worship. We will have 4 of these worship opportunities throughout the year. March 30<sup>th</sup> will be our first such celebration and we will have 1 service that day at 10 am. We pray that all of you will join us on that day to hear about a ministry at Augustana that you may not know happens here.

**Come and See,** and then spread the word that LOVE of neighbor happens at Augustana Lutheran Church.

#### Youth, the Church and the Future

When thinking about the youth, we should pray always for the eyes to see a new world. Never should we condemn them for challenging the way things are or for not blindly following the illusion of a dying old world that failed where they must succeed if there is to be a future to enjoy. We are called now to sacrifice our personal preferences, our fears and our doubts just as our predecessors were called to do before us. When they passed us the baton to begin our phase of the race. Tensions between the old and the new have once again allowed us an opportunity to provide our youth with the space, time and the foundation to dream the tomorrow we will all share. Old ideas keep us closed off from being available and attentive to what is happening in the here and now. The way things always have been is not the only way. That being said, we also can never minimize the importance of our firm foundation in the gospel and its spiritual principles.

What does the youth represent for us? The part of ourselves that maybe we have disconnected from and now appears before us as a sign of the future that we refuse to listen to. If the kids do not find a place in the church how can we expect them to buy into it. Reinventing the wheel is an important phase of a generation's integration into the cause for which the Church stands.

So this brings us to our responsibility in this matter. How can we give grace to the youth we claim we long to see in our church again? I think first and foremost we must never shrink from owning the mistakes we have made in the past and seeking new ways to connect and allow new ideas to be discussed. Out there in the world the church has a reputation of being full of people that exult a certain leader and his teachings but only seem to follow the aspects of the teachings that are convenient. The youth see a church with a history of not-so-spiritual treatment of certain groups of people.

Even our own dear Martin Luther has a checkered past when it comes to his preaching regarding people of the Jewish faith. It's not discussed very often on Sunday mornings, but Luther actually wrote calling for violence against Jews in Germany at the time. Which some followers actually listened to and carried out. Humility is in owning the mistakes of who we name our church after, rebuking the teachings and learning from it. Not whitewashing it or pretending it never happened. We are all saints AND sinners, even Luther. But repentance is about turning away from sin not pretending we are perfect. The youth sees through this kind of denial and falsehood in the same way they see some in the United States attempting to alter the history we teach in our schools and avoid accepting responsibility for some awful things we have done. Kids see this kind of hypocrisy within the church and don't see any reason to have anything to do with it.

It's easy for us to say that the youth just don't care, they are too busy with social media..or blame their parents or society for not keeping religion and a spiritual life as priorities in family life. But at some point we are going to have to look at ourselves in the mirror: Are we creating an environment where the youth can ask tough questions and not get shot down for asking them? Are we addressing social issues that matter to young people today and providing gospel aligned responses to needs they have that the world isn't equipped to adequately meet? The youth right now see a world where power is worshipped, greed is rewarded and cruelty is celebrated. The youth needs the Church, more than ever, to be a safe place where a way of life is offered as an alternative to the anger, hate and callousness they see in the world and a place where LOVE is the motivation for all we do.

Dear Beloved Ones of the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, ELCA,

I truly hope this letter finds you in great spirits and embracing the beautiful revelation of Christ's radiant light during this Epiphany season! Reflecting on the incredible contributions from throughout our amazing Synod, I want to express my heartfelt gratitude for your generous support and unwavering commitment to our shared mission of empowering, equipping, and encouraging the people of God to make Christ known.

Whenever I visit a congregation or ministry, I love reminding everyone that, as bishop, I am not the Synod, nor is 911 E. 86<sup>th</sup> Street, Indianapolis; instead, WE are indeed the Synod together! The word "Synod" literally means "WAY TOGETHER!" Your mission support profoundly impacts our WAY TOGETHER, helping us achieve our goals of serving and revitalizing our ministries for God's love in the world.

One of my personal mantras is, "My very life (as an ex-problem drinker) depends on my constant thought of others and how I may help meet their needs." (Alcoholics Anonymous, pg. 20) Because of you, we can assist our congregations and both rostered and lay leaders in addressing the needs of others, shining a light of hope and compassion in a divided world where many seek recognition, acceptance, safety, and a sense of belonging. Every contribution you make is like a seed planted in faith, blossoming into love and healing for countless lives by empowering, equipping, and encouraging the people of God.

I asked a few of our staff members to share their brief reflections on 2024 and their hopeful insights for 2025. Please consider the following:

**Rev. Dan Forehand, Assistant to the Bishop** – In 2024, we welcomed new candidates for ordained ministry and individuals who said, "Here am I," to serve their congregations as Synod Authorized Ministers. Thanks to the generous support of congregations and individuals in the Synod, we were able to help offset the costs and provide resources to those whom God has called. In 2025, we look to continue to expand these programs, offer new education methods for clergy and laity, and overcome obstacles to saying "yes" to where God might be calling.

Jayme Beneker, Director for IK Synod Disaster Relief: We launched the Endowment for Disaster Response in 2024, forming partnerships within our synod and creating emergency preparedness materials. We are initiating educational programs for congregations to connect them with local emergency management and discuss serving communities during disasters. We link volunteers with organizations excelling in disaster response and support Long-Term Recovery by funding construction projects for disaster-affected areas. An endowment campaign will launch in September during National Preparedness Month. John Dahl, Ecumenical-Connect Program Director – 1) <u>Inspire. Ignite. Invite:</u> Approximately 30 Lutherans and some Episcopalians gather monthly on Zoom to explore spiritual practices and the work of the Holy Spirit. Participants shared reflections on Advent through Synod media. The focus for 2025 is to witness our faith in Jesus. 2) <u>Ecumenical-Connect</u>: Churches discovered more about themselves and their communities. Zion Lutheran in Franklin, KY, built a community labyrinth, while Faith Lutheran in Goshen, IN, collaborates with a preschool to strengthen parent-child relationships. Several congregations will join Ecumenical-Connect in 2025, seeking God's guidance.

Magen Pillar, Interim Storyteller - As we progressed through 2024, we explored the most effective ways to share our Synod's story—whether through video, an expanded and more dynamic E-News, or by supporting our congregations in sharing their narratives. In 2025, we aim to simplify and enhance how we tell the Synod's story, making it more accessible with an improved, streamlined web experience.

As we look forward to the work ahead, I encourage you to continue this beautiful WAY TOGETHER. We can make a real impact on our communities, inside and outside our walls, demonstrating the love of Christ in meaningful ways. Our combined efforts can bring light to those in darkness, support those who need it most, and create connections rooted in care and service.

Let's unite, filled with excitement and purpose, as we embrace all the opportunities. I'm extremely inspired by the generosity and spirit that flourishes in our Synod. Your willingness to share your time, talents, and resources embodies our love in Christ. Together, we can face challenges and respond to the needs of those seeking hope and healing.

Thank you for being such an essential part of God's mission in the world. May God's grace surround you and guide you on this journey of faith and service. Let's move forward with joy and confidence, knowing our efforts make a lasting difference in many lives.


#### **Blessing Box**

# **Stuffed Green Pepper Soup**

#### **Ingredients:**

2 lbs. – Ground Beef
1 can (28 oz) – Tomato Sauce
1can (28 oz) – Diced Tomatoes undrained
2-3 cups – cooked long grain rice (your choice on amount depending on how thick you like it)
1 – green pepper
1 – orange pepper or yellow pepper (can use any combination of colors or all of one kind if you like)
1 – red pepper
2 – beef bullion cube or equivalent of any other style bullion
<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup – packed brown sugar
2 tsp – salt
1 tsp – pepper

Directions:
Brown ground beef, drain. Add remaining ingredients. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and cover.
Simmer 30-40 minutes stirring occasionally until peppers are tender.
Makes 10 servings.

Hint: Add tomato juice if you think it is too thick!
